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
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I Scream, You Scream, We All Scream FOR Halloween



BUILDING...A FAMILY BUSINESS

ith honorary titles like six-year military veteran, "man of the year" for his community outreach and the CEO of Ambassador Home Improvement, Gary Zaccaro is a family-oriented man with a passion for handcrafting perfect homes for his customers and giving back to his community.

Gary was brought up in New York's cultural hub, the Bronx, later in life he would settle in another cultural core, Huntington Village.

Gary's father, Michael Edward Zaccaro, an Italian immigrant, came to the United States at the youthful age of 13. As a young man his father became a brick mason, working hard to make a name for himself. A few years later he began following his true passion which was construction. Eventually he did make a name for himself, becoming a contractor for his very own business, Enzo's Construction. Young Gary would help his father from time to time, working alongside him in the summer. However, he didn't have the

same passion and drive his father had for building, well at least not yet.

In 1984, Gary would go on to enlist in the military for six years. He would then attend Fordham University obtaining a Bachelor of Science degree. His father continued to push Gary towards the family business, but Gary would decline every time. However, the constant "no's" would soon turn into "yes" after tragedy struck in the Zaccaro family.

"My father was always saying, "you should work in the family business." I wasn't a big fan of doing that. I didn't like the hours he worked. I didn't like that he was always stressed out," Gary said.

In 1993, a shift in Gary's mindset occurred after his father's unfortunate passing. Gary was just 27 years old. His father held down the fort and with him gone his mother didn't know what to do. Gary had to take over, not only aiding his family but upholding his father's legacy. He made the decision that from then on, he would follow in his father's footsteps, but the trek to fulfilling such a huge role didn't come easy.

In 1995, Gary got married and his mother moved in with them for comfort and stability. He started working odd jobs to make ends meet. Eventually with only \$25K in the bank he opened his own company, Ambassador Home Improvement. His business focused on smaller-scaled construction work for windows, bathrooms, kitchens and basements. Finally, a few years later he hired his first employee.

"I didn't do any major construction because I was just one person," Gary said.

In 1999, after a short period of time, the business really expanded. Gary now had 25 employees and 12 trucks at his Massapequa headquarters. Ambassador Home Improvement rebranded, now ranging from simple renovations to highly customized interiors, outdoor living spaces and new construction. Thus, making Ambassador Home Improvement the only remodeling company to have a full-time in-house design staff (one of them being his wife, Monica).

Now, Ambassador Home Improvement has since flourished into a full-fledged family-owned business with a showroom located in Plainview, run by his son, Jeremy. His other son Joshua runs estimates for all locations. In September 2024, his third showroom opened in Huntington Village, run by his daughter, Nikayla. Next year, Gary plans to open a fourth showroom in Garden City and it won't be long before his two youngest children, Victoria, 9 and Dominic, 8 join the family business as well.

"Money was never my motivator, it was to work with my family," Gary said.

August 24, 2025, marks 32 years of Ambassador Home Improvement being a successful remodeling business with a list of accolades. They continue to maintain a zero-complaint rate with "Better Business Bureau" and "Consumer Ratings," has an A+rating with the "Better Business Bureau" and "Consumer Affairs" along with receiving the houzz.com Service Award 6 years running. They are also "Green Certified Contractors" and have been voted "Contractor of The Year," two years in a row by the Long Island Press.

Along with his long list of business accomplishments he also has a list of philanthropic achievements.

In 2009, another set of misfortunes for Gary occurred, with both his mother and brother passing just 12 hours apart. To fill this void, he devoted his time and talent in helping those less fortunate.

"There are a lot of people who have it worse than me. Why don't I worry about others and try to help others, instead of worrying about the fact that I am depressed, by doing charity work," Gary said.

In 2012, Gary helped the Sopack family. He and his team built a basement apartment to ensure a family member recovering from Leukemia would be able to have a germfree and isolated environment.

Ambassador Home Improvement was also featured in three episodes of NBC: "George to The Rescue." This nationally televised show features Gary and his team rescuing and renovating three different homes for those in need, specifically children with severe disabilities.

"Being rescued means being loved," said homeowner Denise Hayden, featured on "George To The Rescue."

In 2024, he built a two-story hall of fame building and donated it to the Hamlet of Massapequa, in the town of Oyster Bay. He coached his two sons in baseball through the Massapequa Coast Little League and wanted to give back.

Although Gary's business is fairly new to Huntington Village, he has immersed himself in being an active member of the community.

In October 2024, the Ambassador Home Improvement Huntington Village showroom hosted a spooky haunted house that was a big hit!

In December 2024, he and his team oversaw building just about everything for Huntington's annual Holiday Spectacular on Wall Street. They will now oversee this set up for years to come.

This year, Gary built and donated a \$58,000 graduation stage for the Huntington YMCA. This month, he plans on bringing back his haunted house to Huntington Village, located at his Ambassador Home Improvement showroom.

He was voted "Man of Year" for the community outreach he has done, and he won't be stopping anytime soon.

Gary has shown that he is not only a businessman, but a community and family man, as he and his team continue to treat your family and your home's needs like his own, one brick at a time.

Teen Wellness in the Fall:

SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH DURING SEASONAL CHANGE

A s summer ends and fall begins, many teens notice changes in mood, energy, and motivation. Shorter days, cooler weather, and the pressures of a new school year can all affect mental health. Recognizing these shifts early helps teens stay balanced and supported during this transition.

Why Fall Affects Teen Mental Health:

- Less daylight can disrupt sleep patterns and lower mood.
- Back-to-school stress brings new schedules, academic challenges, and extracurricular demands.
- Social adjustments—changing friendships or new environments—can create anxiety or isolation.
- Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) may emerge as daylight decreases.

Supporting Teen Wellness in Fall:

1. Keep a Routine

When to Get Extra Help

It's normal for teens to feel occasional stress or low energy as seasons change. But if sadness, withdrawal, big sleep changes, or dropping grades persist, professional support from a counselor or therapist may be needed.

Final Thoughts

Fall is a season of change—and also an opportunity for growth. With healthy routines, open communication, and mindful self-care, teens can thrive even as the days grow shorter.

"We didn't have a Y so I wasn't familiar with the organization," Knauer said.

Eileen moved to Huntington after she got married. She worked in the banking industry and took a break from her career to mother her two children. Having children and being around her friends' kids pushed her to want to become CPR and first aid certified. Her mother-in-law introduced her to the Y and Eileen fell in love with it ever since.

At the YMCA Huntington she started teaching swim lessons as a side gig.

"I always intended to go back into the banking industry but I just fell in love with the work I experienced here," Knauer said, "I got very involved in the aerobics side of it and saw the impact it had on seniors.

During her lengthy time at the YMCA Huntington Eileen has held multiple positions. She was a program director, fitness director and was the executive director for eight years. She eventually worked her way up to a regional vice president, overseeing multiple branches. Ten years ago, she even served as the chief senior vice president and chief operating officer.


"It's been a wonderful ride and I have always been very passionate about the health and wellness side in the work that we do," Knauer said.

A Front Row Seat FOR Classic Rock History

untington Village Life caught up with longtime resident Gregg Praetorius to talk about his memoir of his years presenting classic rock giants including Aerosmith, AC/DC, Van Halen and many others in Long Island and New England venues in the 70s and 80s. Released in 2021 by Sonic Bond publishing, Babysitting A Band On The Rocks is available online at Amazon and locally at the NY Music Garage on New York Avenue in Huntington.

"I've been a writer all of my life, but never an author until I published Babysitting A Band On The Rocks. I take that back. I wrote a fantasy at age five about having a dog (my mom was adamantly anti-pooch) and then a short story in 1st grade entitled "Dibs". It was quite the serious tale of a Vietnam infantryman who was always first to claim what was worth keeping from the possessions of his fallen comrades. Ultimately, he gets his, and a new Dibs is christened. They almost took me to the psychologist over that one.

After leaving the concert business in my early twenties, I began a forty-year stint in marketing and advertising. While I wasn't what the industry terms a "creative" – a career copywriter, artist, art director or creative director – I was nonetheless always writing. The "author" part really began the day after my wife and I spent a serendipitous evening with Keith Richards of The Rolling Stones, in Turks & Caicos in 2008. The next morning, I simply had to write down every detail that I could recall despite my hangover from trying to go drink for drink with Keith. I venture to guess that there were plenty of nuggets I forgot.

When I got back to the States, I carved out the time to put the whole experience into an essay,

which I then distributed to friends – particularly the Stones fans within my circle. It was a hit, so I started to write more, starting with an Aerosmith piece, then a Van Halen piece and other bits. That led to a more wide-ranging memoir that I again circulated to friends. A college buddy of mine, an author by trade, true crime his specialty (he's been a talking head on ABC's 20/20), suggested that I write more rock and roll stuff and compile it all into a book, and that he'd submit it to his literary agent.


By the time I completed it in 2017, the agent had become a full-on alcoholic and he got fired, so I ended up being a self-publisher before Sonic Bond picked it up.

The title refers to a multi-chapter story of a year spent with a down and out Steven Tyler and Aerosmith. The Keith bit is near the tail end of the book, under the title "Tossing 'em Back with the Real Cap'n Jack." But probably my favorite chapter is the one titled "A Day in the Life." It's a walk-through of everything that happens during the typical day of an arena rock show, from 6 a.m. when the tractor trailers pull in to about 1 a.m. or 2 a.m. the next morning when they're all packed up and roll out on the road again. You'll never go to a rock concert again without considering all the details that go into giving you your money's worth. It was also the easiest to write. Though it's about three-and-a-half decades since I produced my last concert, after almost 200 of them the drill is ingrained in you. I sat on my front porch in the sun one day and it just poured out, every moment, the sights, sounds, smells and emotions as fresh as if it were yesterday.

But what I was going for overall was for the book to be more than my story, for it to be a

snapshot in time. My hope is that maybe a few decades from now someone can read Babysitting and experience the era through my writings.

Not being an author by trade, it's a real kick knowing that my ideas and words are striking a chord with so many people (forgive the pun.) 


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Take a Scenic Leaf-Peeping Walk:
